Message from the Chairman of the Friends

NEW DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Members Magazine issued in March outlined the Museum's programme of development for the next several years and stressed the need for early and continuing revenue to start it and carry it through. The Friends Committee considered that something dramatic was called for in the way of fund-raising, and decided to accept responsibility for a Development Fund Appeal. Hence the enclosed brochure. The Appeal is made in the name of the Friends and is to supplement, not to replace, the Museum's own efforts. It is not primarily a request for renewed generosity on the part of members of the Friends. But it goes without saying that the Appeal can be greatly assisted by initiatives individual Friends can take.

Carol Hawkins, the Secretary of the Friends, is being paid an honorarium for part-time work as manager of the Appeal, and a start has been made with tapping new sources. In particular the need is urgent to develop interest in the Horsham, Crawley, and Reigate areas. Funds to re-erect, and thus rescue from decay in storage, the Horsham shop and the Reigate house are required immediately to enable the Museum to claim the £20,000 grant offered by the Museums & Galleries Commission, as stressed by Lord Watkinson in his "message" in the brochure. stage in turn.

Horsham: With the assistance of John Warren, the Museum's Hon. Architect, whose practice and home are in Horsham, a number of ideas for activity in Horsham are evolving. Key members of Horsham District Coucil are showing interest and enthusiasm. Friends of the Museum who live in the Horsham area are particularly asked to contact Carol Hawkins with offers of help – human energy is needed!

Success so far is encouraging: In particular, Rush & Tompkins Plc, the developers of the Reigate house site, have given £200 and have offered practical help with materials; Redland Plc, headquartered in Reigate, have offered bricks and one of their Directors, who lives locally to the Museum, has offered and given much personal support. Lignacite have offered concrete blocks and Hepworth's much of the drainage system for the Horsham/Reigate project.

The Draw organised by the Friends, to be drawn at the AGM on 10th November, had already raised £600 by the end of May.

The following organisations are currently assisting the Museum either financially or in kind:

Whiteheads, Estate Agents of Chichester: An interest-free loan for the publication of the Museum's guide book, 1984 reprint.

Area Museums Service for S.E. England: Grant aid towards the Biskupin Exhibition and Tour.

Horley Services Group: Crane hire for North Cray Hall House re-erection.

Sussex Mutual Building Society: Sponsorship for Heavy Horse Demonstration Day.

The Friends and the Museum are immensely grateful for these early expressions of faith in the proposed projects.

The Longer Term: The need for some £80,000 this year is urgent, but to enable the Museum's plans to continue fund-raising ideas are being formed for longer term fruition:

Events: The Friends Committee is exploring the possibility of staging a "Fashion Through the Ages" show, and auctions, open gardens, and other such activities away from the immediate Chichester/ Singleton area, ... Would Members be willing to help by organising something?

Deeds of Covenant: Also important for the longer term are donations made by this method so that income is promised for years to come, and their value is increased at the taxman's expense!

Interest-free loans: Many people cannot offer substantial gifts to the Museum, but may be able to provide loans for, say, a six-month period, interest-free, with the investment benefits of such loans accruing to the Museum.

FRIENDS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

To increase membership and thus widen the interest in the Museum and the support that can be given to it by the Friends, a scheme has been introduced this season for refund of the Museum's admission charge to those who join the Friends during their visit to the Museum. This has proved popular and some eighty new members have been recruited so far.

FINALLY

The emphasis in my message has been on the need for help, both practical and financial. But of equal importance is that membership of the Friends gives enjoyment to its members. Events such as the Country Fair, the Spring coach trip, and the various musical and theatrical occasions staged at the Museum are, we hope, to members' liking – not to mention the advantage of free admission to the Museum and the widening range of activities and exhibitions the Museum is now offering.

Gordon Beningfield presents limited edition prints for Museum Development Fund.

An exhibition of paintings by one of Britain's leading countryside artists, Gordon Beningfield, opens at the Museum in August. On Friday, August 3rd he will be present at a special preview in the Crawley Hall, when among the paintings on show will be watercolours of Museum buildings which will be sold as a limited edition of 250 prints to raise funds for the Museum.

Gordon Beningfield has established himself in recent years, both as a respected artist, and a broadcaster and writer. He has made a number of television appearances, notably BBC Television's "In the Country", and has written three major books, including the most recent, "Hardy Country".

During 1983 he painted at the Museum, and the prints of his watercolours, reproduced on fine art paper, size 16" x 10" approximately, will be sold to aid the Friends of the Museum Development Fund, which is being allocated to the next phase of building at the Museum.

At the preview at 7pm. Mr. Beningfield will talk about his work and in addition the author and poet Robert

Gittings, of East Dean, an authority on Thomas Hardy, will read extracts from Hardy's poetry. The exhibition opens on August 4th and continues until September 2nd.

New Manpower Services Commission Scheme

A new scheme will start work at the Museum in June. Members of the team under the supervision of the Hon. Librarian and the Library Assistant, Caroline Hallam, will undertake the cataloguing of the material already in the Library. In all there will be seven members on this scheme of whom some will be part-time. Applicants must be registered un-employed and over 18. The scheme runs for 52 weeks during which time it is hoped that a good proportion of the material will be available for use as a result of this work and it is also hoped that the training given to members of the scheme will assist them in their search for permanent employment.
